As you see in this newsletter, the various boards and committees have described their ongoing work and upcoming events. You will also see an update from the Pastoral Search Committee and where they are at this point in the process. Having done this with several other churches, I see we will be together through the holiday season, so I invite you to come and enjoy all that is here with those who are a part of this family of faith. Come and experience God's presence in the midst of worship, at coffee hours, at our Kerygma Bible Study sessions (come and see), at our committee and board meetings, at the Trick or Treat event on Oct 20, the Pancake Breakfasts, and the work to prepare for our Church Fair in November. I also invite you to consider the names listed in our prayer list and either visit them or send a card. For we know that "where 2 or 3 are gathered, God is also there," Matthew 18:20

I'll share with you that each morning, I have a ritual where I sit in my car with my coffee at the town green beside the circular gazebo listening to Elton John sing "The Circle of life" and consider the day's events and what is here. Meditation and prayer are a part of my daily life... and many of my afternoons conclude at the Plum Island beach where I enjoy the beautiful waves and watching people and birds and giving thanks for the wonder of life. I've learned to listen within in order to let go of concerns and find peace. I hope you have a practice as well.

I was at a group meeting, when we read a passage and someone reflected how it made her think of the story of how life is like a tapestry..... that many times... all we can see is the underside of the work with all the threads tattered and loose and it can look like a mess. That we can't see the topside that has become this beautiful scene. She was sharing that God sees the top of the tapestry and marvels at all that we are becoming, but we feel like those threads being pulled hither and you in the work of the creator. We can get irritated and worn down- because- we can't see the topside. Except on a few occasions.

The interim process is like that ... and I've been observing certain things of which you've not been aware ... as signs of the progress that you are making to be ready for your new pastor whenever he or she presents herself to the Pastoral search committee and they recognize each other and the celebration takes off.

Many of you will may remember Carole King's song, that I've been singing ever since that day, "My life has been a tapestry of rich and royal hue; An everlasting vision of the ever-

changing view; A wond'rous woven magic in bits of blue and gold; A tapestry to feel and see; Impossible to hold." Kathy Olmsted knew of a Story and poem which is just beautiful and I include it following my message, entitled "God's Tapestry" by Tim Challies..

As we go into this fall season of its rich and royal changing colors and hues, let's trust that God is at work in us making a beautiful tapestry. Let's come together to worship and laugh, play, weep for and comfort one another. Let's add our love as we remember the beautiful tapestry that we are all creating here in Rowley. Let us give thanks for the grace, love and light that our God is pouring upon us each day and being revealed through each of us. As Patti taught at VBS, we are each 'unique and special' creations of God. May we give thanks and worship and share our love as the body of Christ here in Rowley.

God's Tapestry, Tim Challies January 19, 2015

Have you ever compared the front and back of a tapestry? The front of a tapestry is art. In the hands of a skilled weaver it displays incredible artistry and fine detail. The world's best art museums collect the world's best tapestries and display them there as examples of a rare but beautiful form of art. The back of a tapestry is a mess. A tapestry is made by weaving together different-colored threads, and the images and designs are created by the interplay between the different colors and textures. What is clear on the front is opaque on the back. The back shows something of the image, but it looks more like a child's attempt than a master's: it lacks nuance and clarity and detail. Where the front is smooth, the back is covered in knots and loose ends.

We are meant to see and admire the front of the tapestry, not the back, and this has often served as an illustration of the truths of Romans 8:28: That God promises to use every single event in our lives to bring about good. Though I have often heard Joni Eareckson Tada use the illustration, I believe it originated with Corrie Ten Boom and her poem "The Master Weaver's Plan." "Oft' times He weaveth sorrow; / And I in foolish pride / Forget He sees the upper / And I the underside." It serves as an effective illustration for the truth that for now we get to see only the underside of all God is weaving together in this world, while clinging to the promise that someday we will see the upper side and marvel at what he has been doing.

But it illustrates something else equally well. I have been thinking a lot lately about good deeds—not the good deeds people do to try to earn the favor of God, but the good deeds people do when they already know that Christ has earned them the favor of God. Titus 2 calls us to be people that are zealous for good works; in Matthew 5 Jesus tells us to let our light shine before others by doing good works; Ephesians 2 tells us that God's very purpose in saving us was enabling us to glorify him by the good works we do for others. As Christians we are to be known for our good works—those things done for the glory of God and the good of other people.

And so we go through life doing these good works, and far more often than not, these are small and seemingly inconsequential deeds. We rarely talk a person out of recklessly taking his own life; we rarely write a check that utterly transforms a life or ministry; we rarely save a drowning child or defuse a ticking time bomb. Instead we interact with people for moments at a time and attempt to say something—anything—that may be encouraging; we write small checks and place them in the offering basket; we have brief conversations with children, and we share just a shred of the Good News with that taxi driver.

Most of our good deeds go unnoticed and unmarked by others. I suspect that even we ourselves fail to notice or remember the majority of the good deeds we do. But not God. God sees them all, knows them all, remembers them all, and uses them all.

Just as some day we will see the beautiful tapestry God has been weaving through our suffering, through the events we never would have chosen, in the same way we will see the tapestry this Master Weaver has been creating through those good deeds. We will see how a kind word resonated in a person's heart even days and weeks later; we will see how that small amount of money was used to accomplish something amazing; we will see how that little shred of the gospel was the pebble in the shoe of the person who had hardened himself against God.

Some day God will show us his tapestry, we will see how God has woven each of these little deeds together to his own glory, and we will rejoice. Here is Corrie Ten Boom's poem:

> My life is but a weaving Between my God and me. I cannot choose the colors He weaveth steadily. Oft' times He weaveth sorrow; And I in foolish pride Forget He sees the upper And I the underside. Not 'til the loom is silent And the shuttles cease to fly Will God unroll the canvas And reveal the reason why. The dark threads are as needful In the weaver's skillful hand As the threads of gold and silver In the pattern He has planned He knows, He loves, He cares; Nothing this truth can dim. He gives the very best to those Who leave the choice to Him.

MUSIC NOTES...

It's a crisp autumn morning with brilliant sunshine outside and the furnace turned on inside! We all have a way to respond to such a day depending on what we're facing for the next twenty-four hours. What are you feeling? Composers, lyricists, preachers and people everywhere are always searching for a way to respond. Shall we jump for joy, cry, mope, celebrate, be angry, pray or praise God? Praise God, well maybe but how? Christians have been joining to worship God for two thousand (2000) years because God affects our lives in both positive and negative ways. Our response is important. It does matter!

Musicians in churches are people who can lead and express the many feelings that are aroused in peoples' lives each day. How can we support each other through music in worship? How can musicians lift our spirits no matter our mood? Unfortunately, this is a difficult balance to reach. Over the centuries many resources in chants, hymns, solos, cantatas, requiems, and oratorios have been created to enhance the worship of God. We have a style of music that has not reached the doors of First Congregational Church Rowley. It's called praise music. "This music brings us closer to our grace-full, loving, justice-seeking God; it moves us with the message and mission of Jesus Christ and surprises us with the power, mystery, and playfulness of the Holy Spirit. It takes us to a spiritual place where words alone cannot, helping us to address God with heart as well as mind, expressing joy and lament, struggle and hope." We are still in an interim period of ministerial leadership. However, we have not been forbidden to try something new.

There has always been an unanswered question regarding what is appropriate music for worship. Church musicians are NOT employed to entertain us. Their job is to support our praise, prayers and thanks to God during worship services. I believe that it's important to have live musicians to encourage our participation. Type of musical instrument is not a priority but leadership definitely is! Let's incorporate some praise music during Sunday services. Let's use music that children can learn and in which youth and adults can find meaning. It will take dedication but I feel we can find the right balance for Rowley.




