New Testament Reading Philippians 2:1-13 The Message

If you've gotten anything at all out of following Christ, if his love has made any difference in your life, if being in a community of the Spirit means anything to you, if you have a heart, if you *care*—then do me a favor: Agree with each other, love each other, be deep-spirited friends. Don't push your way to the front; don't sweet-talk your way to the top. Put yourself aside, and help others get ahead. Don't be obsessed with getting your own advantage. Forget yourselves long enough to lend a helping hand.

Think of yourselves the way Christ Jesus thought of himself. He had equal status with God but didn't think so much of himself that he had to cling to the advantages of that status no matter what. Not at all. When the time came, he set aside the privileges of deity and took on the status of a slave, became *human*! Having become human, he stayed human. It was an incredibly humbling process. He didn't claim special privileges. Instead, he lived a selfless, obedient life and then died a selfless, obedient death—and the worst kind of death at that—a crucifixion.

Because of that obedience, God lifted him high and honored him far beyond anyone or anything, ever, so that all created beings in heaven and on earth—even those long ago dead and buried—will bow in worship before this Jesus Christ, and call out in praise that he is the Master of all, to the glorious honor of God the Father.

What I'm getting at, friends, is that you should simply keep on doing what you've done from the beginning. When I was living among you, you lived in responsive obedience. Now that I'm separated from you, keep it up. Better yet, redouble your efforts. Be energetic in your life of salvation, reverent and sensitive before God. That energy is *God's* energy, an energy deep within you, God himself willing and working at what will give him the most pleasure.

Gospel Reading Mark 14:1-11 The Message Susan Hazen

In only two days the eight-day Festival of Passover and the Feast of Unleavened Bread would begin. The high priests and religion scholars were looking for a way they could seize Jesus by stealth and kill him. They agreed that it should not be done during Passover Week. "We don't want the crowds up in arms," they said.

Jesus was at Bethany, a guest of Simon the Leper. While he was eating dinner, a woman came up carrying a bottle of very expensive perfume. Opening the bottle, she poured it on his head. Some of the guests became furious among themselves. "That's criminal! A sheer waste! This perfume could have been sold for well over a year's wages and handed out to the poor." They swelled up in anger, nearly bursting with indignation over her.

But Jesus said, "Let her alone. Why are you giving her a hard time? She has just done something wonderfully significant for me. You will have the poor with you every day for the rest of your lives. Whenever you feel like it, you can do something for them. Not so with me. She did what she could when she could—she pre-anointed my body for burial. And you can be sure that wherever in the whole world the Message is preached, what she just did is going to be talked about admiringly."

Judas Iscariot, one of the Twelve, went to the cabal of high priests, determined to betray him. They couldn't believe their ears, and promised to pay him well. He started looking for just the right moment to hand him over.

Welcome to a *Maundy Thursday Agape Meal*A Virtual "Peace Meal" of Love and Togetherness



This Maundy Thursday (Holy Thursday) evening April 1st at 7:00 PM we are all invited to an online Agape Meal to be eaten in our homes with others in our congregation joined together via Zoom. We will gather together to remember the night that Jesus was betrayed. This is also the night he gave to us the sacrament of the "Lord's Supper".

For our time we will come together in an informal way. We will be invited to share our reflections about the past year, lift up any blessings we have felt about our faith family, and then listen as we hear read some of the scripture passages that relate to the events of this evening over 2000 years ago.

When Jesus shared Passover with his disciples, it was in the home tradition and setting of the Passover meal. The sharing of bread, wine, and hearty dishes. In this home setting Jesus gave us his "new commandment" to love one another. All happened in a home - in a room where Jesus drew his friends together as host, teacher, friend, and master who was there to serve them all. This is not a formal Passover meal in the Jewish tradition, but it does contain the sense of that unique way to break bread together.

Maundy Thursday may be considered, at its heart, a homely affair. During this extraordinary time that requires us to practice social distancing in order to help protect everyone from the rapid spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus, we are being taken back to our households as our base-point. In this we actually have a blessing as our technologies for joining others in fellowship can connect us even when we are alone in our households. We can join with each other on this holy night, as we pray, sing, and hear the Word of God while we eat and share together, each in our own homes yet joined in the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.

To prepare your home for the service, please do the following -

- Prepare a simple meal to share in your home that is fitting with your own dietary requirements and Lenten fast.
- We are reflecting what a household meal in early Palestine might offer. For this evening Jesus is our special guest and we give him the place of honor at the table. For our Agape Meal simple foods are preferred. Salads, soups, meatless proteins, cooked lamb, cheeses, olive oil for dipping, dried and fresh fruits and nuts, simple grains or pastas, honey, dried and smoked fish. Whatever you think is the food they may have shared in the Upper Room that night. (Please include bread and wine (or grape juice) as we will be having a time for communion.)
- Set your space for your meal, with a laptop, tablet, cell phone, or internet-connected screen in the room where it can be near and visible to everyone during the meal and you can speak into your device or microphone.
- Make sure your device is connected to the internet. We will be using Zoom and it would be best to download this app necessary
 for our shared online worship gathering. The Zoom Link will be sent out to everyone prior to the event and it will be on our
 website.
- Set your table with your meal, and bring a Bible or other readings if you wish. You may light a couple of candles if that is safe.
- Be prepared to clear your table completely at the conclusion of the service.
- At the designated time for your gathering congregation, link up to your shared online service for the beginning of this Maundy Thursday and Agape Meal liturgy. Then take your places at your table to partake in the meal and to participate as you are able in the hearing of the Word, the sharing of your reflections, the remembering of Jesus Christ's own sharing of himself in the first Holy Eucharist, and readying ourselves to follow Jesus to the Cross. Finally, to make the event more personal folks will be invited by Rev. Tom, from time to time, to read some of the scripture passages which appear on the screen.
- A PowerPoint display of graphics, readings, and musical moments will guide us along through the evening
